


Answering the call



Built for today, designed for tomorrow

The single mom, the brick mason, the retired nurse and the fireman. Their stories differ, but one thing remains the same: **they work hard to create prosperity for themselves, their families and this community.**

But life happens. Household finances can be fragile and it doesn't take a major crisis to fall behind.

Rising childcare costs show how modest increases stretch already tight budgets. Last year, families saw a 4.5% increase – bringing the regional average to \$28,330

a year – with another 3–5% rise projected for 2026. For many, these mounting expenses force difficult tradeoffs, often between a nutritious meal and everyday expenses.

Our seniors are also vulnerable. Fixed incomes must stretch across food, medication and housing, while isolation and mobility challenges create additional barriers. As medical costs rise (Medicare by a projected 9.7% this year), the strain grows. **So, it's no surprise we've seen an 11.5% increase in older neighbors visiting our pantries.**

We're built to step in when these neighbors need help. And mobilize with community partners, state and municipal leaders – like when need surged by more than 26% in the fall. In just weeks, we sourced, purchased and distributed 3.5 million pounds of food.

And we're not standing still. **We're designing new collaborations with hospitals, senior centers and rural**



points of care and refining how we work so we can reach neighbors sooner, serve them better and strengthen the systems that support them.

We couldn't do this without you. Your support makes this work, and this impact possible. Thank you for believing that no one in Central Virginia should go hungry, and knowing that thriving communities start with full plates.

Our Platinum designation by Candid is dependent on vigorous organizational and operational reporting, in addition to financial performance. **And our more than 15-year 4-star Charity Navigator rating places us in the top 1% of the 200,000 charities evaluated.**

As a member of the Feeding America network, we're required to maintain a robust reserve of cash and liquid investments. In 2025, this reserve helped us stay steady amid elevated food and operating costs, rising community demand and the increasing need to purchase food to supplement donated product.

Additionally, our endowment funds ensure that we can absorb some of these costs while maintaining strategic purchasing power for future needs like fuel, transportation, warehousing and evolving our hunger-fighting programs.
